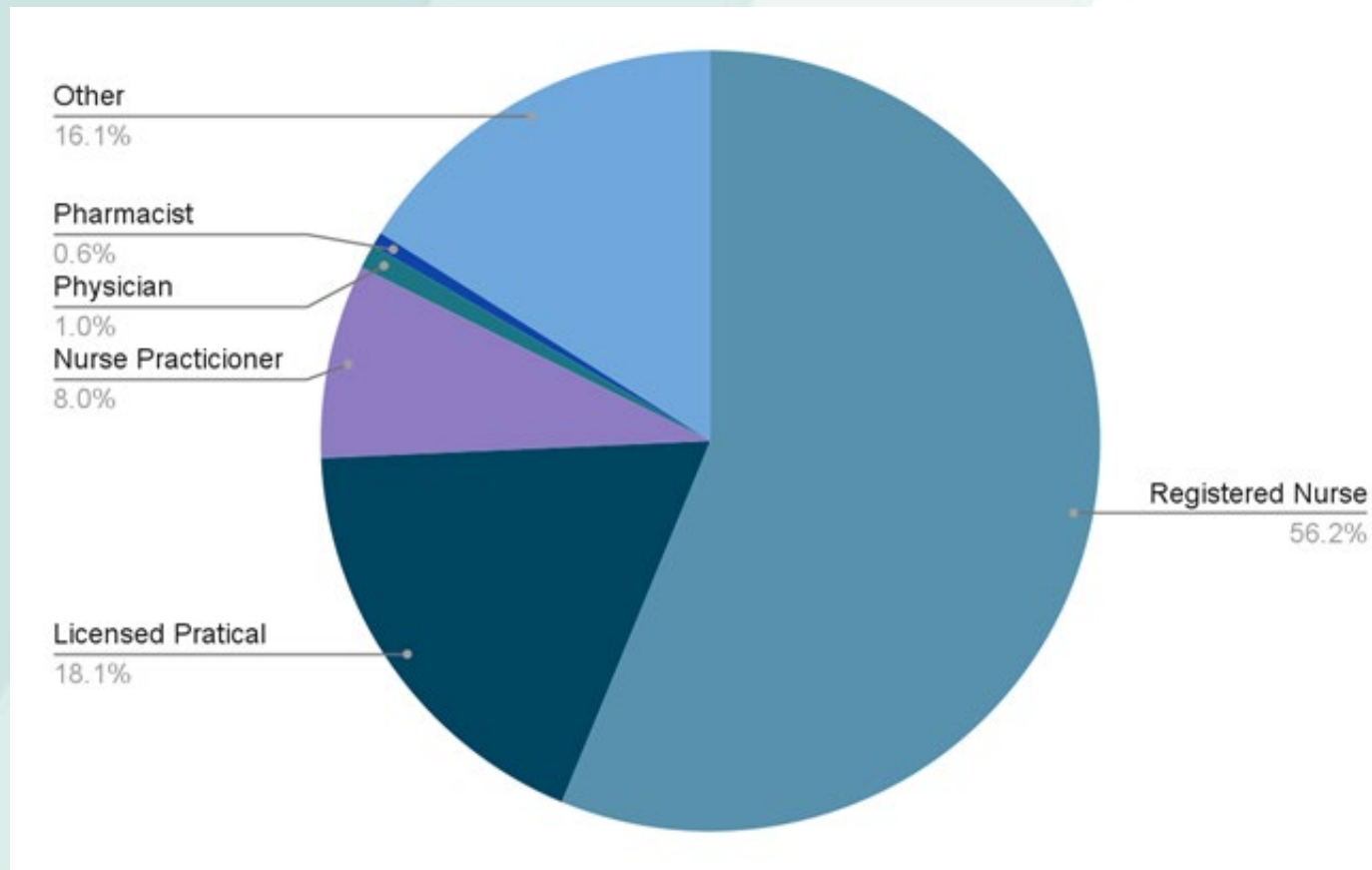

 - Ideas for increasing adult immunization rates in MA



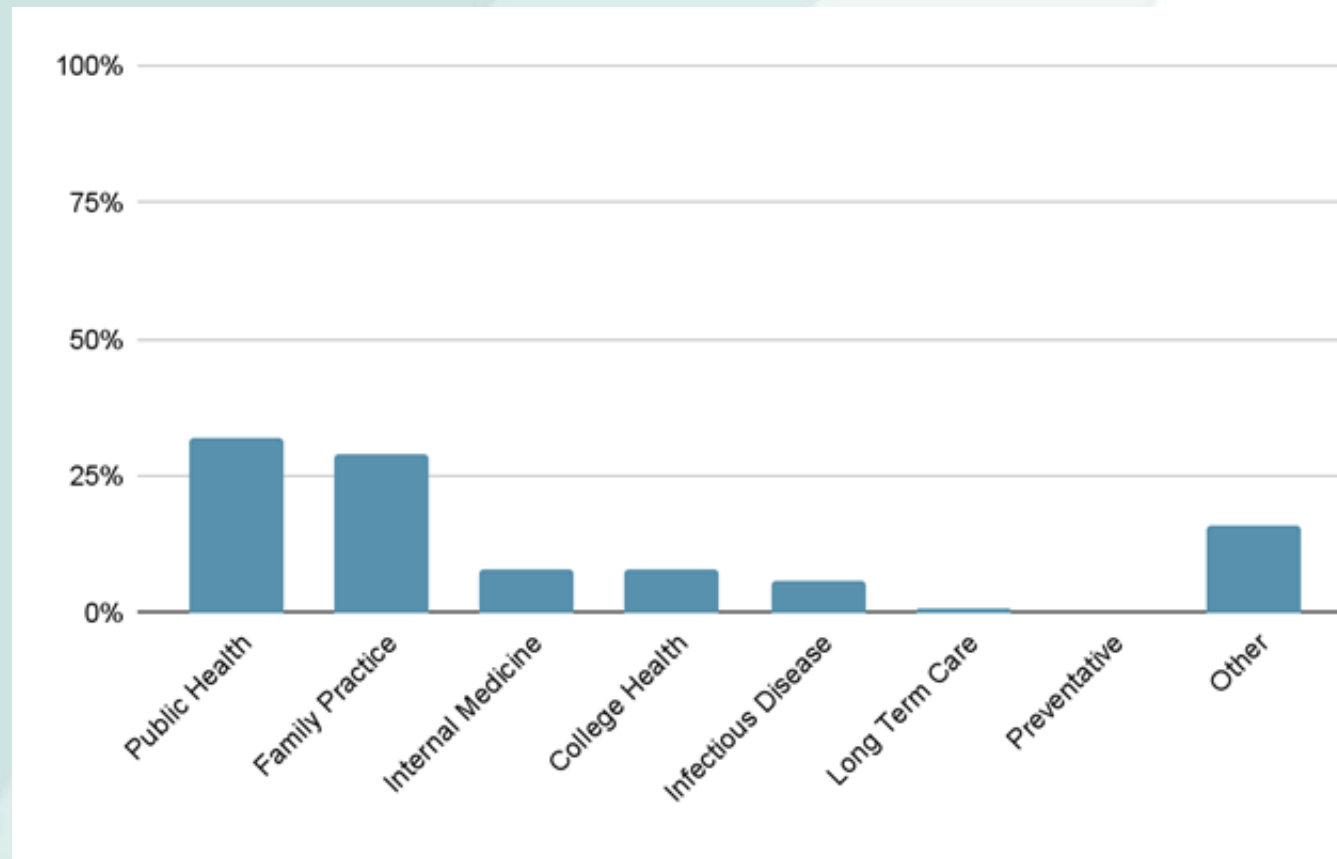
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Q1: What is your professional affiliation?



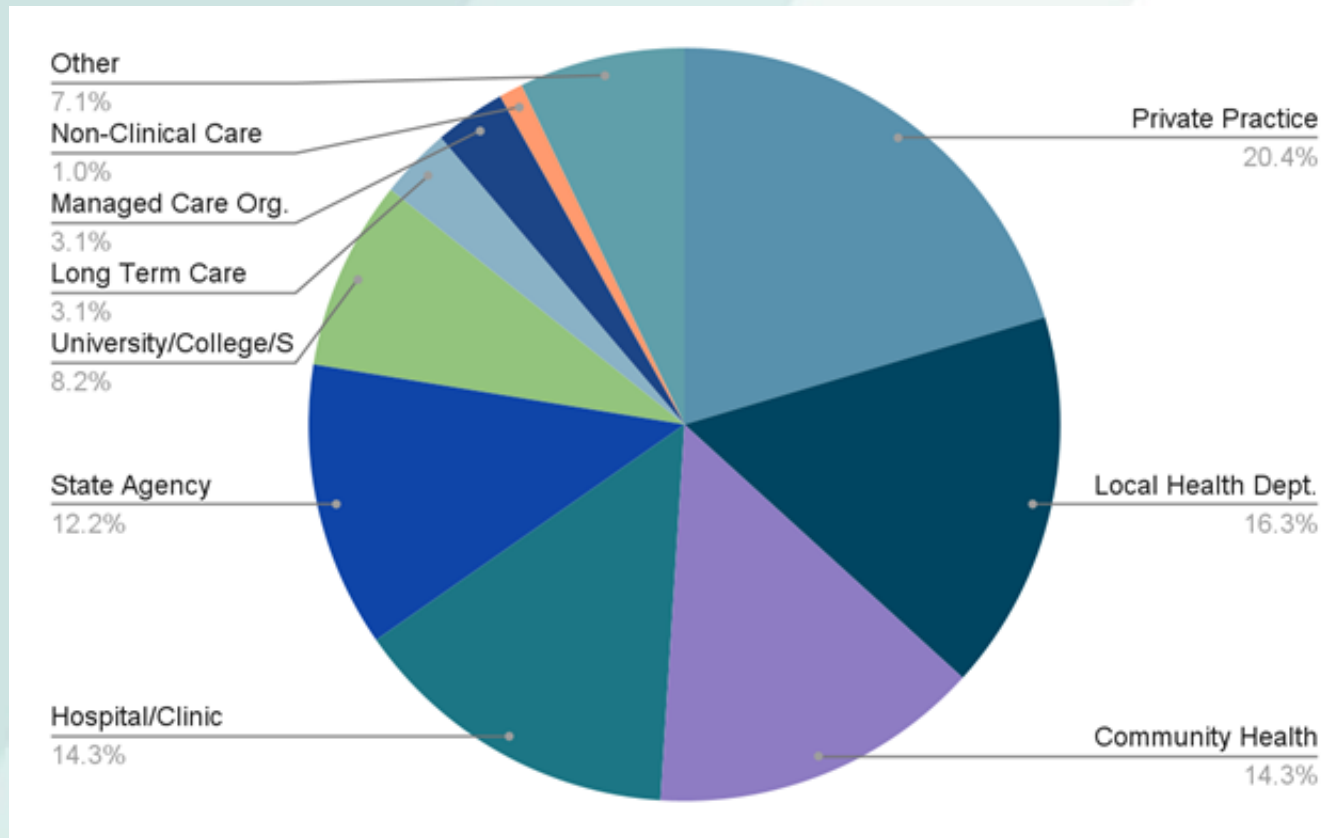

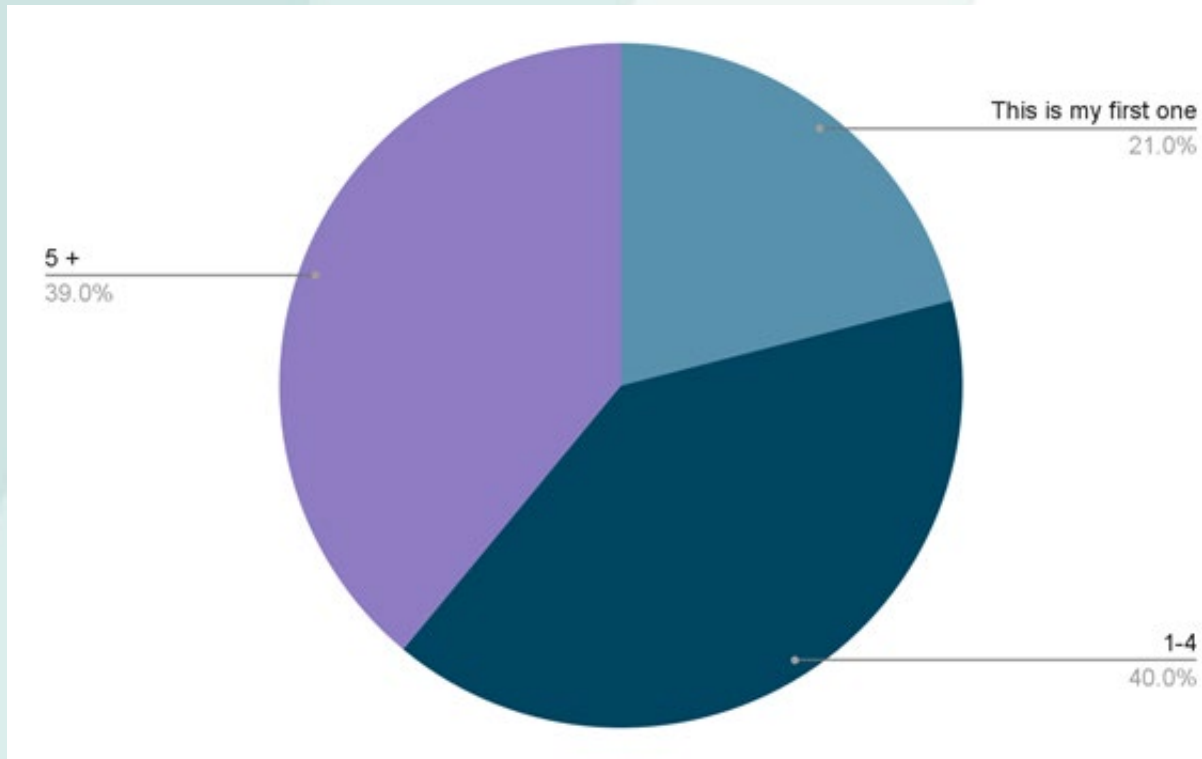

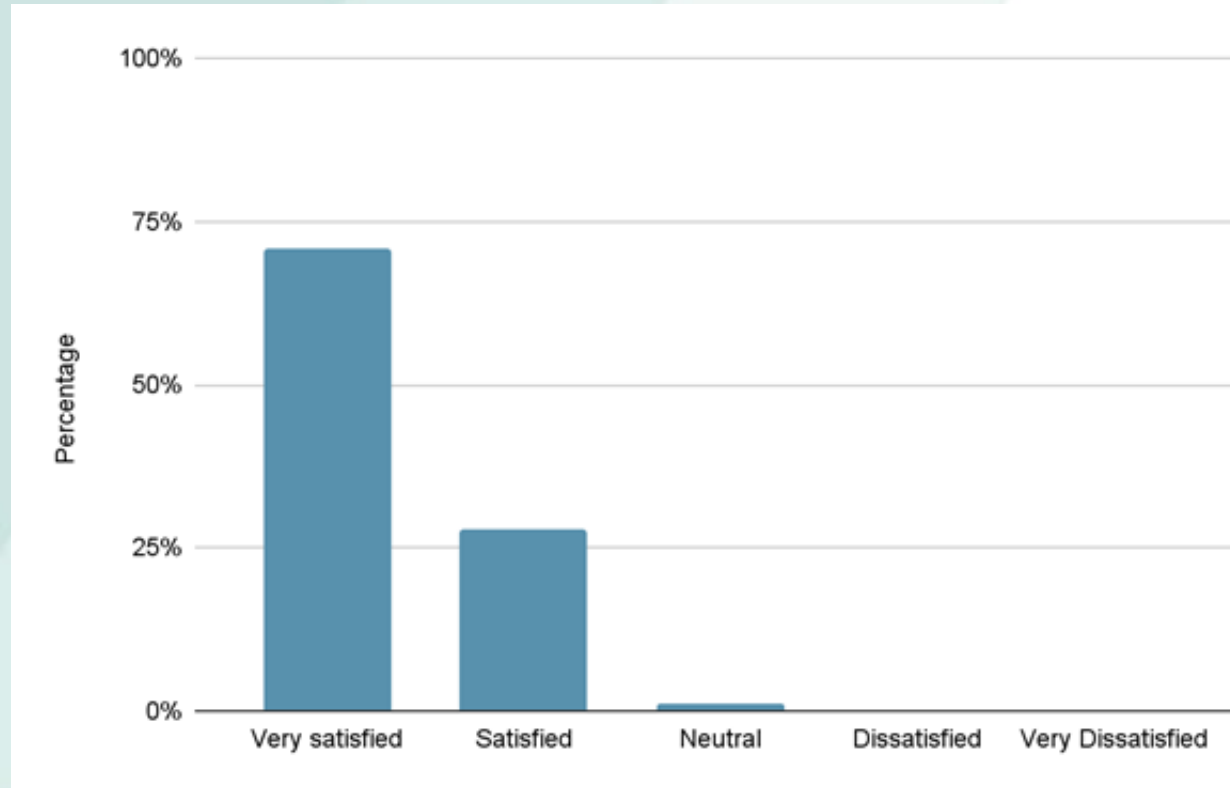
